Content Requirements for a Cued Articulation Course

Speech Pathologists wishing to run a Cued Articulation course should ensure that the course fulfils the requirements set down by Jane Passy. The course material needs approximately 6 hours to cover the content described here, with appropriate practice and discussion time. It can be run over one day (takes about 7 hours including breaks), over two mornings of 3½ hours, or three afternoons after school of 2¼ hours. All the aspects below must be presented, in the given sequence. It is important not to attempt to teach the technique simply by teaching the cues, without the background information. Colour coding is an essential facet of the course.

5	Application of CA to a PA program	CA applied to classroom activities following the sequence of phonological awareness development
